Prayer Letter - May 2014

I am excited to report that we just mailed my "What Will Messiah Look Like" tracts to 1,000 Jewish people here in the Dallas/Fort Worth Metroplex. This became a group project as with the help of many volunteers from around the country who hand addressed the envelopes and provided the postage, and many more locally who stuffed and sealed the envelopes. We also had two churches give a special offering to help us with the cost of printing the tracts. We cannot express our gratitude enough for the gracious assistance we have been receiving! We included a response card and have taken out a special email address to receive responses. Please pray that these tracts will be read and we will begin to receive responses which will open the door for me to meet with and witness to these Jewish people. Once I have worked through these initial responses, we will send out the next 1,000 tracts. Once again we will be dependent upon help with postage as well as hand addressing the envelopes. Please let us know if you would be willing to assist us in this outreach project.

The month of May can be challenging where scheduling church meetings is concerned. Mother's Day and High School and College Graduations can make it difficult. However, we saw the Lord open the door for some very exciting meetings. I was in West Texas on two separate occasions, both were very small towns and both were very special meetings. In one the churches organized a community wide Passover Seder. The entire town got behind this meeting filling the church, which turned out to be bi-lingual. The pastor of the Hispanic church stood beside me and interpreted everything I said for the Spanish speaking people who attended. This meant that while my Christ in the Passover, which normally takes me 1 hour to present, took almost 2 1/2 hours. Still, in the end we saw the Lord move in the hearts and lives of all who attended.

My 2015 Israel Tour is filling up. We are currently half full with several from one church assuring me they will soon be registering. The dates are April 27-May 7, 2015. I would love to have you join us for this life changing event! We still have room but as you can see, the seats are filling quickly so please do not hesitate! Ahavath Messiah Ministries Mission Statement

Ahavath Messiah translated from Hebrew means Love Messiah.

The purpose of Ahavath Messiah Ministries is to take the Love of Messiah to Jewish people so that they may come to faith in the Messiah of Israel. Equally as important is the need for us to encourage the believers in the churches to embrace their responsibility to extend their witness of Messiah to Jewish people.

During WWII Chiune Sugihara, who in 1940, became the Japanese consul general to Lithuania where Polish Jewish refugees had relocated during World War II. As Nazis threatened to invade Lithuania, thousands of Jews surrounded the Japanese consulate to ask for visas to escape. Disobeying his bosses in Japan, Sugihara issued thousands from July 31 to Aug. 28, 1940. Sugihara and his wife stayed up all night writing visas. The Japanese government closed the consulate, located in Kovno. Even as Sugihara's train was about to leave the city, he kept writing visas from his open window. When the train began moving, he gave the visa stamp to a refugee to continue the job. The refugees typically followed a route that took them via train to Moscow, then via the trans-Siberian railroad to Vladivostok and on to Kobe, Japan. Most stayed in Kobe for a few months then went to Shanghai, China, and elsewhere. It's unknown exactly how many people can trace their ancestry to a Sugihara survivor, though the Visas for Life Foundation whose mission is to "perpetuate the legacy" of Chiune Sugihara, estimates it to be more than 100,000. More conservatively, the Simon Wiesenthal Center has estimated that 40,000 people are alive today because of the Sugiharas.
